



School Sports Premium at Silverdale 2017 - 2018

What is the Sports Premium?

Most schools with primary-age pupils receive the PE and sport premium in the academic year 2017 to 2018, including:

- schools maintained by the local authority
- academies and free schools
- special schools (for children with special educational needs or disabilities)
- non-maintained special schools (schools for children with special educational needs that the Secretary of State for Education has approved under section 342 of the Education Act 1996)
- city technology colleges (CTCs)
- pupil referral units (PRUs provide education for children who can't go to a mainstream school)
- general hospitals

Funding for the PE and sport premium:

Schools receive PE and sport premium funding based on the number of pupils in years 1 to 6.

In cases where schools don't follow year groups (for example, in some special schools), pupils aged 5 to 10 attract the funding.

Purpose of the funding:

Schools must use the funding to make additional and sustainable improvements to the quality of PE and sport on offer.

This means that schools should use the premium to develop or add to the PE and sport activities that the school already offers and build capacity and capability within the school to ensure that improvements made now will benefit pupils joining the school in future years.

There are 5 key indicators that schools should expect to see improvement across:

- the engagement of all pupils in regular physical activity - the Chief Medical Officer guidelines recommend that all children and young people aged 5 to 18 engage in at least 60 minutes of physical activity a day, of which 30 minutes should be in school



- the profile of PE and sport is raised across the school as a tool for whole-school improvement
- increased confidence, knowledge and skills of all staff in teaching PE and sport
- broader experience of a range of sports and activities offered to all pupils
- increased participation in competitive sport

Schools can use funding to:

- provide staff with professional development, mentoring, training and resources to help them teach PE and sport more effectively
- hire qualified sports coaches to work with teachers to enhance or extend current opportunities
- introduce new sports, dance or other activities to encourage more pupils to take up sport and physical activities
- support and involve the least active children by providing targeted activities, and running or extending school sports and holiday clubs
- enter or run more sport competitions
- partner with other schools to run sports activities and clubs
- increase pupils' participation in the School Games
- encourage pupils to take on leadership or volunteer roles that support sport and physical activity within the school
- provide additional swimming provision targeted to pupils not able to meet the swimming requirements of the national curriculum
- embed physical activity into the school day through active travel to and from school, active playgrounds and active teaching

Our Aims

We aim for more children to be both engaged in and enjoying, sporting activity and physical exercise. We will be monitoring how well used the new planned primary equipment is and the recently introduced outdoor gym and trim trail throughout this academic year.

All primary students get one additional session of Forest Schools/Outdoor Learning per week. This is designed to improve both physical fitness and mental health wellbeing. This will be monitored and evaluated throughout 2017 - 2018.

Every Primary student that requires additional SEMH input has been assessed using the Thrive profile. This profile will then build up a curriculum which is designed to improve their mental health and wellbeing incorporating sports activities and outdoor learning.

The Key Stage 2 yard is being redesigned to improve play, social skills and fitness levels.

Year 7s are timetabled for two additional afternoons doing activities that have been designed through their individual Thrive profiles, this is a new activity on the timetable and we will be evaluating the impact on behaviour, engagement and wellbeing over the next two terms.

What was the Impact 2016 - 2017?

We have gained the Healthy School Award.

All Primary students get one term of swimming, we aim for all our children to be confident swimmers by the end of Year 6, all pupils made progress in their swimming with 50% moving from the small pool to the large pool due to improved proficiency.

There is a positive impact upon behaviour through targeted rewards relating to PE, this is evidenced through school data monitoring ready to learn behaviours and the number of significant incidents recorded for each pupil.

All secondary students get at least one afternoon of Outdoor Education per week, this increases confidence levels, raises self-esteem, improves fitness and skill sets. The students perform as a team and regularly return to school keen to share their achievements, such as catching fish having never experienced fishing before. Pupils report feeling good about conquering fears and facing new challenges such as overcoming a fear of heights when climbing and a fear of water through improving skill sets in water sports. We believe the PE and wellbeing work delivered in Primary provides a strong foundation for students in KS3 and 4.
